








History & Legislative Framework

• The Ministry of the Solicitor General developed the Provincial CSWB Planning Framework to help guide municipalities in their planning efforts.










2022-2026 Plan & Priority Areas









Cost Benefit & Return on Investment

CSWB Plans that are *proactive* and focused on *social development and prevention* reduce financial burden of crime.



Preventing a single career criminal can save society over **\$2 million**^{1.}



\$1 invested now in crime prevention and early intervention **saves \$7** spent on incarceration, victim services, and other future associated criminal justice costs^{2.}



The economic impact of a chronic young offender into adult criminal life include³

- Total cost of criminal path without interventions (up until age 30): \$1.4 million
- Costs averted with strategies that address acutely elevated risks: \$0.89 million
- Costs averted by early intervention strategies: \$1.2 million
